2. Classic Albums Live Brings Rush's Epic Album 2112 to Life at The Playhouse Nov 17

On Friday, November 17 at 7:30pm, perennial Fredericton Playhouse favourite Classic Albums Live returns to the stage to perform *Rush: 2112*. Classic Albums Live presents skilled musicians who recreate the greatest albums of the '60s and '70s live on stage – note for note, cut for cut. Don't look for costumes and look-alike theatrics at these rock recitals, just pure musicianship and songs that shaped a generation.

Released in 1976, *2112* is the fourth studio album by Canadian rock band Rush. It features a seven-part suite that constitutes a full side of the record, telling a dystopian story set in the year 2112. This album marked Rush's first real commercial success, eventually reaching platinum status. Today, *2112* is widely considered to be one of the greatest progressive rock albums of all time.

This performance marks the first Classic Albums Live show featuring a Canadian artist to be performed on the Playhouse stage, and it promises to be an unforgettable night for rock fans.

A free film screening of *A Bold Peace*, sponsored by Voice of Women for Peace, will take place on Saturday, November 18 at 2:30pm at Conserver House, located at [180 Saint John St.](#)

In his famous “Cross of Iron”/ “Chance for Peace” speech in 1953, President Eisenhower critiqued the military-industrial complex while asking, “Is there no other way the world may live?” In Costa Rica today, we glimpse another way to live. In 1948, Costa Rica dismantled their military establishment and intentionally cultivated security relationships with other nations through treaties, international laws, and international organizations. Free of the burden of military spending, they used the financial savings to invest in their people, creating strong public institutions including public higher education and universal health care. In short, Costa Ricans created a society committed to peace, solidarity, and international law. They have survived with safety and relative prosperity for over 65 years without a standing army.

Why this film now? Costa Rica has lived for 68 years, without a military, in one of the world’s most violent regions. Their track record of diplomacy and nonviolent conflict resolution deserves examination, by other small nations as well as those of us living in the U.S., home of the world’s most powerful military. The film also details how demilitarization made a middle class revolution possible. Government budgets are zero-sum games – that’s not rocket-science, but the film documents just how true that is. In the case of Costa Rica, demilitarization allowed them to invest in their people, to spend significant sums on public education and public health care – far more than their militarized neighbours in Central America. Valerie Lawson's poetry has been published in Main Street Rag, BigCityLit, and others. She has won awards for Best Narrative Poem and Spoken Word at the Cambridge Poetry Awards, and was a finalist for the 2015 Rita Dove Award. She has co-hosted the Boston Poetry Slam, emceed the National Poetry Slam in Sweden, and was invited as a Legacy Poet to the first Women of the World Poetry Slam. Most recently, Valerie edited *3 Nations Anthology: Native, Canadian & New England Writers*, which features poems, essays, and fiction from 58 writers, ranging from those for whom this is their first publication to a nominee for the Pulitzer Prize. Valerie teaches poetry workshops in New England, and has worked as a bookseller. She once worked as a security guard at a Rolls Royce show.

Michael Brown published his first poems when East Texas State University hired him to head a Ph.D. program in the teaching of English. By 1990 he became involved with poetry slam, and moved to Boston where he and his wife started the Boston Poetry Slam. Slam and poetry resulted in trips to Europe, exchanges with Irish artists, and coordinating the first Poetry Olympics in Stockholm. Michael has published poetry in *Falling Wallendas* (Tia Chucha in 1994), *Susquehanna* (Ragged Sky in 2003), *The Man Who Makes Amusement Rides* (Hanover in 2003) and *The Confidence Man* (Ragged Sky in 2007). *The Martin Bormann Dog Care Book* collects political poems from the last 50 years. In 2007, he and Valerie Lawson moved to Downeast Maine where they take in retired sled dogs, and where their front windows look across the Passamaquoddy Bay to St. Andrews, NB. [Back to top.](#)

Loving Vincent

Loving Vincent is the first fully painted biographical animated film. Each of the film's 65,000 frames is an oil painting on canvas, using the same technique as Van Gogh, created by a team of 115 painters.

In summer 1891 Vincent Van Gogh died of a gunshot wound. Why did this ambitious young artist kill himself just as he was creating some of his finest work? What was the state of his mental health, and what was going on in his private life? He didn't leave a suicide note; he didn't write a letter; there's no first-hand evidence given by Doctor Gachet (his physician). Vincent and his brother Theo spent several hours together before he died, and Vincent was fully lucid. But Theo never relayed in writing anything about the conversations that they had.

They came up with a noir-inspired detective story (featuring real people Van Gogh knew), set a year after the artist's death. The film takes in the various conflicting accounts given by residents of Auvers. It also explores the not-impossible theory that Van Gogh was murdered by René Secrétan, a local 16 year-old who enjoyed ridiculing the quiet, anti-social artist, and went as far as admitting to having given him the gun. His tragic death has long been known, what has remained a mystery is how and why he came to be shot. *Loving Vincent* tells that story.

Tulip Fever

Based on the novel by celebrated author Deborah Moggach (*These Foolish Things*), *Tulip Fever* tells the tale of a torrid romance between a painter and a beautiful, young married woman at the height of tulip mania in 17th Century Amsterdam. Drawing from an adapted screenplay by playwright Sir Tom Stoppard (*Shakespeare in Love*, *Anna Karenina*), director Justin Chadwick (*The Other Boleyn Girl*) once again employs his masterful eye for detail to bring this period drama to vivid life.

When wealthy merchant Cornelis (Christoph Waltz, *Big Eyes*; *Inglourious Basterds*) commissions a portrait of his beautiful wife Sophia (Alicia Vikander, *The Danish Girl*; *Testament of Youth*), an irrepressible passion begins to bloom between Sophia and the talented young artist (Dane DeHaan, *Two Lovers and a Bear*; *Devil's Knot*) hired to commit her beauty to canvas. As the young star-crossed lovers hinge their future together on an investment in the risky tulip market, tensions build and deceptions abound as the stakes grow higher.

Beautifully shot in muted palettes reminiscent of Vermeer, *Tulip Fever* features quietly powerful performances from its two leads, as well as another wonderfully ominous turn from the Academy Award-winning Waltz. Dame Judi Dench also brings her infamously dry wit to the role of a surprisingly cheeky abbess. *Tulip Fever* interweaves the narrative of one of the most astonishing economic events in European history with a deeply intimate tale of desire, betrayal, and perilous ambition. As the young lovers become ever more daring in their commitment, both to each other and towards a shared future, we are reminded of that universal truth: the course of true love never did run smooth.

This year 30 limited release, independent foreign and Canadian films will be shown. Admission is \$8/film, but a yearly film society membership reduces admission cost to \$5/film.
